Initial Statement:

I am about halfway through the LD&T program here at Purdue, and I couldn't be happier in it. With my background being in Music and also in Religion, this program was a welcome change of pace for me. Having been chosen to be the Technology "Liaison" for my school to my district because of my tech prowess, I contemplated going back to school for a long time. I was always really interested in going back, but being a (at the time) single dad prevented me from doing so.

I chose Purdue's LD&T program mainly because it is one of the best, but also because it carries with it the weight of Purdue's name. I strive to get great grades, and I push myself very hard.

I maintain that I would like to be heavily involved in the Technology aspects of this degree, though, I have been pleasantly surprised with how much I enjoy the ID side. Within the next year, I plan to be working in a tech role that will allow me to design, create, implement, and present professional development courses, both online and in person. The more that I am able to teach adults, the happier I will be. If I am unable to move into that type of job situation, I would happily consider Curriculum design, leaning more to the ID side of this program. Additional Thoughts:

My school's counselor wants to "hire" me to do some parent enrichment classes on Internet Safety for their homes, and all I need to do now is work out the logistics.

I honestly think that in regards to the LDT competencies, I'm on a good track. As with the rest of us, I don't think I'm totally there yet, but I will get there soon. I do not plan to enter a PhD program after this. I don't see that as a natural progression in meeting my goals.

Besides, I want my social/family life back. I am happy with the plan of study that I submitted to Purdue (though I do keep wondering if I should take 528 HPT instead of 564 Integration/Management of Computers in Education, and also 588 Motivation & ID, instead of 568 Ed. Apps of the Internet).

Combining everything I've learned that I want to do with everything that I'm interested in doing will be interesting. I am extremely interested in gamifying learning, though I am not a game designer and have little to no skill in actually doing that. I think that my best practice to move forward with this will be to integrate game-based learning strategies, including motivation, into my trainings.
